




Blessing of Animals on the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi Sunday, October 4th, 2020

Land Acknowledgement

The Gathering

Jesus Christ, we assemble with all your creatures in this circle of life. We ask you to join our circle and celebrate with us.

Jesus Christ, as we join in celebration with you and all creation, We ask for your blessing, your *shalom*, on the creatures present here whom we love; and on all creatures celebrating in the wild.

In the name of God, who creates all life,

In the name of Jesus Christ, who redeems all life, and in the name of the Spirit, who renews all life, we cry with all in the circle of life: Shalom! Shalom! Shalom! May your blessing come!



Francis of Assisi 4 October Friar, 1226

Francis grew up in a very wealthy family and seemed to have not a care in the world until he was twenty years old, when a chance encounter with a leper left him appalled by his own useless- ness. Soon afterwards he heard Jesus speaking to him from a painting of the crucifixion over the altar of a local church. He threw away his wardrobe and renounced his father's wealth in order to care for the poor and the crippled. In 1208 he heard the commission which the risen Lord gave to his apostles, "Go, make all nations my disciples," and knew that it was also addressed to him. Francis began to train his followers for the task of making Jesus truly known and loved among the ordinary people of Italy. Out of this movement developed the Order of the Lesser Brethren, commonly called the Franciscans.

Francis believed that nature itself was the mirror of God. He called all creatures his "brothers" and "sisters", and even preached to the birds and supposedly persuaded a wolf in Gubbio to stop attacking some locals if they agreed to feed the wolf. In his Canticle of the Creatures ("Praises of Creatures" or "Canticle of the Sun"), he mentioned the "Brother Sun" and "Sister Moon", the wind and water. His deep sense of brotherhood under God embraced others, and he declared that "he considered himself no friend of Christ if he did not cherish those for whom Christ died".

A Reading from Pope Francis Excerpted from Pope Francis, Laudato Si': On Care For Our Common Home

I do not want to write this encyclical without turning to that attractive and compelling figure, whose name I took as my guide and inspiration when I was elected Bishop of Rome. I believe that Saint Francis is the example par excellence of care for the vulnerable and of an integral ecology lived out joyfully and authentically. He is the patron saint of all who study and work in the area of ecology, and he is also much loved by non-Christians. He was particularly concerned for God's creation and for the poor and outcast. He loved, and was deeply loved for his joy, his generous self-giving, his openheartedness. He was a mystic and a pilgrim who lived in simplicity and in wonderful harmony with God, with others, with nature, and with himself. He shows us just how inseparable the bond is between concern for nature, justice for the poor, commitment to society, and interior peace.

[Francis'] response to the world around him was so much more than intellectual appreciation or economic calculus, for to him each and every creature was a sister [or brother] united to him by bonds of affection. This is why he felt called to care for all that exists. His disciple Saint Bonaventure tells us that, "from a reflection on the primary source of all things, filled with even more abundant piety, he would call creatures, no matter how small, by the name of 'brother' or 'sister.'" Such a conviction cannot be written off as naïve romanticism, for it affects the choices which determine our behavior. If we approach nature and the environment without this openness to awe and wonder, if we no longer speak the language of fraternity and beauty in our relationship with the world, our attitude will be that of masters, consumers, ruthless exploiters, unable to set limits on their immediate needs. By contrast, *if we feel intimately united with all that exists, then sobriety and care will well up spontaneously.* The poverty and austerity of Saint Francis were no mere veneer of asceticism, but something much more radical: *a refusal to turn reality into an object simply to be used and controlled.*

What is more, Saint Francis, faithful to Scripture, invites us to see nature as a magnificent book in which God speaks to us and grants us a glimpse of his infinite beauty and goodness. "Through the greatness and the beauty of creatures one comes to know by analogy their maker" (Wisdom 13:5); indeed, "his eternal power and divinity have been made known through his works since the creation of the world" (Romans 1:20).


Bless the Lord, you whales and all that swim in the waters;sing praise to him and highly exalt him forever.Bless the Lord, all birds of the air;

their young will lie down together,


and the lion will eat straw like the ox.

In life, in death, in life beyond death, God is with us. We are not alone. Thanks be to God.




Reflection

2. God of the earthquake, God of the storm, God of the trumpet blast How does the creature cry woe, how does the creature cry Save?


3. God of the rainbow, God of the cross, God of the empty grave How does the creature say grace, how does the creature say thanks?

Show your pity on prisoners and refugees, and all who are in trouble. **Lord, have mercy.**


Forgive our enemies, persecutors and slanderers, and turn their hearts. **Lord, have mercy.**
